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WELCOME TO KINOTEKA 2026!

The 24th KINOTEKA Polish Film Festival returns from 4 February to 29 March 2026, presenting a curated selection of the most important contemporary and classic Polish films, documentaries and special events across London's leading cinemas.

This year's edition is anchored by a major retrospective of films by Andrzej Wajda, Academy Awarded auteur, marking the 100th anniversary of the director's birth. One of the most influential filmmakers of post-war Europe, Wajda understood cinema as a moral, civic and political act. His films confront the defining experiences of the twentieth century: war, occupation, totalitarianism and the struggle for freedom while asking enduring questions about individual responsibility, compromise and resistance. In a time of renewed geopolitical tension and historical revisionism, Wajda's work remains urgently relevant.

The Opening Gala on 4 February at BFI Southbank will feature Wajda's *Ashes and Diamonds*, inaugurating the retrospective 'Portraits of History and Humanity'. Presented across BFI Southbank, the ICA and Ciné Lumière, the programme offers a rare opportunity to experience such an extensive selection of Wajda's film output on the big screen, tracing how personal stories intersect with the great fractures of European history.

This year's 'New Polish Cinema' strand will feature the most significant Polish productions of the past year, including *Franz* by Agnieszka Holland, Poland's official submission for Best International Feature Film at the 98th Academy Awards and *Chopin, a Sonata in Paris*, Michał Kwieciński's lavish biopic of Frédéric Chopin. Films in this strand will be screened at renowned London cinemas including BFI IMAX, the Barbican Centre, The Garden Cinema, Ciné Lumière, and the ICA.

KINOTEKA 2026 also reflects on cinema as a shared European language of memory, by a tribute to Krzysztof Kieślowski, a showcase dedicated to Marcel Łoziński, a master of documentary, and *Trains* by Maciej Drygas, with use of metaphor and montage to map the continent's collective experience, its movements of people, the machinery of war, moments of silence and fragile peace. Together, these works reveal Europe not as an abstract idea, but as a lived history shaped by trauma, displacement and moral choice.

Special events at this year's KINOTEKA will include *Blokowisko (The Estate)* at the Southbank Centre, a new work created by composer and performer Blanka Barbara Stahl, blending contemporary dance, live electro-acoustic music and immersive video scenography. The performance is inspired by a story Andrzej Wajda once envisioned but never brought to the screen.

Samsung KX will welcome us again this year, providing their Kings Cross space for the presentation of a conference on Artificial Intelligence and how it is transforming the film industry.

By bringing these many voices together, KINOTEKA 2026 invites audiences to reflect on cinema's unique ability to bear witness to history, to humanity, and to the responsibilities of the present.




In the last days of the Second World War, Maciek, a Polish resistance fighter, is tasked with the assassination of a Communist official. Wajda's classic drama, which cemented his position as a world-class filmmaker, features an iconic central performance by Cybulski – the 'Polish James Dean' – who contributes immeasurably to this probing look at the complex post-war future for a new nation and its people. Paris, 1835. Frédéric Chopin has left Poland and established himself as a darling of the salons and toast of the French court. However, behind the brilliance and wit, the 25 year old celebrity is battling illness and inner conflict whilst composing the works that we celebrate today as poetic genius. Michał Kwieciński (*Filip*) works once again with rising star Eryk Kulm (as Chopin) and Michał Sobociński (as cinematographer) to create a dazzling interpretation of the composer's life – a multi-million Euro production that was one of the most anticipated Polish films of 2025.

This simple intimate romance challenges stereotypes, showing how moving outside comfort zones can be empowering. Directed by Tadeusz Śliwa, acclaimed for his music videos, it includes original music from Kaśka Sochacka and Kortez whilst Małgorzata Szumowska's regular DoP Michał Englert ensures that the images shine.

Selected as Poland's official submission to 98th Academy Awards for Best International Feature Film *Franz* is a bold, dynamic portrait of a young creative who finds himself at odds with the world around him. Described by Holland as one of her most personal films it explores the essence of Franz Kafka (brilliantly portrayed by Idan Weiss and by Josef Trojan as

Kafka's alter ego) as he navigates institutions of family, business and state. Marek Epstein's script interweaves past and present, exposes structure and shows his world from atypical angles: sound and design emphasise fragility and turmoil. A richly rewarding experience for lovers of Kafka and newcomers alike.

How well do we know the person we love? From the director of *Clergy* and *Rose*, an intense psychological drama that uncovers issues of domestic violence within Polish society, winning awards in Poland and abroad. Agata Turkot gives a memorable performance as Gośka whose passionate romance, that promised love and fulfilment, begins to turn sour as she builds a life with her new partner Grzesiek. Exposing the delicate lines of trust, love and control behind closed doors this is a courageous exposé of personal and political boundaries that will be hard to forget.

Jan Komasa's first English language film is a dark genre blending fable which shines a light on the excesses of trash culture. Anson Boon (1917) delivers a mercurial performance as transgressive bad boy Tommy who wakes up far away from home, the subject of a 'rehabilitation project'. Quirky couple Graham and Riseborough (and Kit Rakusen, their chilling son "Sunshine") have an absurdist, or perhaps psychotic, redemption plan. Co-produced by long-time collaborators Jeremy Thomas and Jerzy Skolimowski and filmed in Warsaw and Yorkshire this is sharp social commentary full of unexpected tonal shifts.

Preoccupied with his continued sense of alienation in Polish society he sets out to explore the Warsaw street where he lives, talking with neighbours, seeking to understand their experience. Turning perspectives around, he offers a unique, personal view on his adopted country. 

Stanisław Wyspiański's influential 1901 play details a marriage ceremony between a poet and peasant. The wedding party is attended by a cross-section of society. However, the veneer of harmony is broken when ghosts – drawn from local history and legend – appear to the revellers. Wajda's adaptation employs dizzying cinematography and creates an eerie atmosphere as he presents a searing critique of the nation. It became one of the most culturally significant works of Polish cinema.

A unit of Polish freedom fighters goes underground to escape German troops, in the final stages of the 1944 Warsaw Uprising. Wajda's claustrophobic, nightmarish masterpiece employs haunting images to convey their struggle as they journey through the city's sewers. The film that brought international acclaim for the director, *Kanal* is based on true events. It is an evocative portrait of the Polish resistance movement and a heartbreakingly powerful milestone in Polish cinema.

Danton wasn't Andrzej Wajda's first brush with Stanisława Przybyszewska's seminal work of Polish political theatre, *Danton's Case* (1929), which he first directed for the stage in 1975 at Teatr Powszechny, to rave reviews. The 1981 Palme d'Or success of *Man of Iron* facilitated making Wajda's next film in the form a lavish Polish-French co-production. Two riveting performances – titular one by Gérard Depardieu, as well as Wojciech Pszoniak's magnetic Robespierre – are two magnificent anchors for the historical drama of the great conflict between two chief architects of the French Revolution, a moderate and a radical. Wajda proved a perfect director for a white-hot political costume drama, coming from a country experiencing its own political upheaval in the early 1980s. The film remains a first-rate spectacle and a poignant political tale, in which people leave and breathe lofty ideas, making them into flesh (and blood) of everyday political change.

Omar Sharif and scandalous film director Bertrand Blier!) adds a welcome dash of intensity to the film, scripted by the celebrated Jean-Claude Carrière and shot at the very cusp of the Cold War coming to an end. Made for West-German television in 1972, this loose adaptation of Mikhail Bulgakov's cult novel *The Master and Margarita* (published posthumously in 1967) is perhaps the most experimental feature in Andrzej Wajda's oeuvre. The film stages Jesus' trial by the titular Roman consul in present-day Germany, with a Way of the Cross taking place in the busy streets of Frankfurt, and the legal proceedings set in the Nurnberg remnants of monumental architecture of the Nazi era. Casting Wajda regular Wojciech Pszoniak as Jesus (referred to as Yeshua Ha-Nozri) proved to be an inspired choice, while Wajda himself appears as a TV reporter bearing witness to the Passion. The film originally aired on the Good Friday of March 29, 1972 and remains a bold retelling of the foundational event of Christianity, as well as one that might have inspired Norman Jewison's later staging of the Gospels in contemporary costume in *Jesus Christ Superstar* (1973).



Hanna Schygulla, best-known for her collaborations with Rainer Werner Fassbinder, stars as Paulina, a small-town German shop owner, whose husband is fighting on the front of World War Two. In his absence, she begins an all-consuming love affair with a young Polish prisoner of war (Piotr Lysak), which brings her local reputation (as well as her business) into peril. Lyrically scored by Michel Legrand, *Love in Germany* was greeted by *The New York Times* in the year of its American premiere as "the most romantic film ever made by Mr. Wajda". 

Andrzej Wajda was Andrzej Żuławski's senior by 14 years, and in terms of international festival prizes (Palme d'Or, Academy Award), he seems to be the more recognized of the two. And yet, Wajda's filmography was regularly visited, interfered with, as well as downright haunted, by the presence of his brilliant student, assistant and (ultimately) creative opponent. Żuławski's initial fascination with Wajda was clear in his choice of a M.A. thesis he wrote on the latter's *Kanal* in 1959 at IDHEC in Paris. Later on, he assisted Wajda on the Polish segment of *Love at Twenty* (1962) and the epic *Ashes* (1966). From 1970s on, Żuławski turns from protégé to rival, as his progressively more frenetic films challenge Wajda's more classical approach. It shows how a fleeting encounter can leave indelible traces, shaping both personal memory and collective experience.

Blokowisko fuses electro-acoustic sound, socially charged choreography, and immersive videography into a landscape of loss and resilience. Created by composer-performer Blanka Barbara Stahl, BAFTA-winning choreographer Anthony Matsena, visual artist –8, and creative strategist Ignatius Sokal, the work was devised in the studio of Olivier-award-winning choreographer Russell Maliphant OBE.

The story is devastating in its simplicity: an actor meets a woman, they share a single day, and the next morning he cannot find his way back to her through the endless housing blocks of an unforgiving city. What remains is the silence of a connection lost, and the weight of love that slipped away.

From this fragile moment, *Blokowisko* unfolds as a shared human experience. It asks how intimacy shapes us, lingers within us, and dissolves into the universal need to be found, remembered, and not to vanish without trace.

By giving form to a story Andrzej Wajda imagined but never filmed, the work honours his legacy while insisting on its relevance today – resonating through the anonymous apartment blocks of contemporary cities and the fragile bonds strained by scarcity, migration, and the vastness of urban scale.



An absolute antidote to *A Short Film about Killing*, this cinematic gem is delicate and restrained, inviting us to experience the tender yet voyeuristic side of love. We observe a lonely young man watching a woman across the street, and what begins as a quiet act of watching her from afar transforms into a fragile encounter between two vulnerable people. Both *A Short Film About Love* and *A Short Film About Killing* are feature-length adaptations of *The Decalogue*, a TV series by Kieślowski first broadcast in late 1989.

Kieślowski invites us to contemplate parallel lives, spiritual doubles, and those fleeting moments when we feel touched by something beyond reason. For anyone who has ever wondered if they have a doubleganger somewhere out there, this film gives that intuition a haunting, beautiful resonance. Like all Kieślowski's films, *The Double Life of Veronique* will stay with you long after you leave the cinema.

INTRODUCTION

JK TALKING HEADS

1980, 16 min

In this deceptively simple yet profound short documentary, Kieślowski interviews a cross-section of Polish people – ranging from infants to centenarians – posing questions such as “When were you born?”, “Who are you?”, and “What do you most wish for?” Their responses form a mosaic of hopes, identities, and concerns, creating a portrait of Polish society at a moment of social and political tension.

JK FROM A NIGHT PORTER'S POINT OF VIEW

1977, 17 min

This documentary centers on Marian Osuch, a factory night porter who delivers an unsettlingly frank account of his life and worldview. Much of the film follows him at work as he explains his strict belief in order, rules, and the enforcement of authority, including support for harsh punishments and suppression of dissent.

JK SEVEN WOMEN OF DIFFERENT AGES

1979, 16 min

Kieślowski paints a poetic portrait of seven ballet dancers at different stages of life – from a young child just beginning her first steps, through seasoned performers, to an older dance teacher. Each vignette observes these women in rehearsal and performance, forming a meditation on aging, aspiration, discipline, and the passage of time as expressed through the demanding art of classical dance.



JK HOSPITAL

1977, 21 min

Filmed in the emergency department of a Warsaw hospital, this cinéma-vérité documentary captures the relentless pace of medical work – from briefings to night shifts – without voice-over commentary. The camera observes doctors and patients in tense, sometimes darkly humorous situations, revealing the pressures of care under demanding conditions and offering a gritty, humanist glimpse into everyday hospital life in Communist Poland

JK REFRAIN

1972, 10 min

One of Kieślowski's early non-fiction shorts, Refrain juxtaposes images of bureaucracy at work with the ritual of a funeral and the continuation of paperwork afterward. In doing so, the film reflects on the mechanical persistence of institutional routines and how everyday systems persist even in the face of human loss

Call Kieślowski is an immersive AI exhibition inviting audiences into an intimate conversation with the legendary filmmaker Krzysztof Kieślowski. Drawing on his legacy, participants will be able to converse with Kieślowski in real time. Part installation, part cinematic encounter, the experience offers new ways of engaging with cinema by rethinking our relationship with Kieślowski in particular. Rather than imitating the man, *Call Kieślowski* creates a space for reflection, dialogue, questioning how artificial intelligence can coexist with cinematic authorship. The world premiere takes place at Cinéma Lumière on 13th of March, followed by a two-week exhibition at Coal Drops Yard, King's Cross, from 16 March.

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


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
